We're off to a great start in Acorns class this term. We have been enjoying the story of Handa's Surprise as part of our topic which is a comparison between Kenya and the UK. Introduction to the violin for youngsters

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A day of music workshops attracted nearly 100 pupils to a Shropshire school.

Newcastle-on-Clun School hosted the event featuring British violinist and musicologist, Rupert Marshall-Luck.

The day of workshops was delivered by English Music Festival (EMF), which has a base in the Clun Valley, though its main venue is in Oxfordshire.

Pupils from the three schools that comprise the Blue Hills Federation were able to attend the event.

The youngsters were treated to an illustrated talk about the violin before being shown a variety of clips demonstrating the instruments.

The schools had secured the use of 18 violins from the County Music Services for use by the children.

Rupert and his wife Em, assisted by their 10-year-old son Tristan, demonstrated violin and bow holds and helped the pupils to create sounds from the instruments.

Chris Richards, lead teacher at Newcastle-on-Clun School, said: "It was great to have a musician of the

calibre of Rupert Marshall-Luck to come to our school and give a talk and performance.

"Many children haven't held a violin before so it was a great opportunity for all three schools across the Bluehills Federation."

The festival is searching for funding to facilitate further such projects with the federation and possibly other schools in the area.
