Class 1 - End of Term Round Up

What a busy term! The children have loved our topic of 'Fire! Fire!' where they have learnt all about the Great Fire of London. They learnt about how the fire started, why it spread so quickly and how the people of the time managed to get the fire under control. We've talked about leather buckets, fire breaks, water squirts, fire hooks and even gunpowder to stop the fire from spreading. The children have been very enthusiastic, and it is amazing how much they can recall about their history learning this term. Linked to the topic, the children have learnt about how the fire service has changed and it was lovely to have a visit from firefighters Zoe and David, who showed us some of the clothing they wear to protect themselves and even shared that they like to have ice creams when they come back from a call!

In Geography, the children have been exploring the UK and finding out about the countries and capital cities. To expand the children's knowledge, we focused on the capital city of London so they could make connections to the history they had learnt. We turned the classroom into London with the children creating famous landmarks out of a variety of resources. There was a junk modelled Big Ben, Tower Bridge and London Eye, Buckingham Palace built from Duplo, our train set became the London underground, the Tower of London was built from wooden bricks and the children used a roll of wallpaper to create the River Thames with their own drawings of boats.

The children have also been busy learning about the human body and what we need to survive as well as different animal groups including birds, mammals, amphibians, reptiles, fish and insects. We've also learnt about what animals eat and how they can be omnivores,

herbivores and carnivores. At Forest School, we have been thinking about the changing seasons and how some animals hibernate to survive the winter. We also had a wonderful autumnal fire where we warmed up pumpkin soup to eat with our freshly made bread. We have also explored and learnt about Diwali, Harvest, Creation, Remembrance and of course Christmas, with the children enjoying being the post person to deliver Christmas cards, opening our Advent Street calendar, joining in with different Christmas games and retelling the story of the first Christmas.



Throughout the term, the children have worked exceptionally hard on developing their phonics with Nursery developing their listening skills, Reception beginning to segment and blend and Year 1 learning alternative pronunciations. They have also been developing their handwriting and writing skills. We have enjoyed a range of books including The Three Little Pigs, Look Up! and a

non-fiction book about The Great Fire of London. In Maths, the children have continued to develop their understanding of number and shape, thinking carefully about patterns and spotting



Thank you for all your continued to support and all the reading being done at home. It really makes a difference to the progress your children are making. All there is left to say is have the most wonderful Christmas and have a happy New Year! We look forward to hearing all about it in January.


Between the start of the academic year and October half term we were playing weekly fixtures at Ludlow Primary School. Our children performed excellently and finished in second place overall after beating two teams from St Lawrence's Ludlow and last year's county champions Corvedale. Unfortunately, the team from Ludlow Primary School proved a little bit too strong in the final for us.

Since the half term break, we have continued our weekly fixtures at Craven Arms Community Centre. This time taking on two sides from Stokesay, two from Wistanstow and our now seemingly unshakable nemesis Ludlow Primary. Once again, the children performed brilliantly beating both Stokesay and Wistanstow teams but losing out to Ludlow, giving us a second-place finish in the group stages. This of course meant a third game of the term against Ludlow in the overall final. It's known that missing school for any reason can cause a child to fall behind in their learning. Sometimes children will find it difficult to settle back into school after a break.

When children are taken out of school during term not only does the education of the individual child suffer, but it can cause disruption to the rest of the class, with teachers having to repeat work and give extra help so that the pupil can catch up.

There are 190 school days in an academic year, leaving 175 days free for families to take holidays.

Not taking into account other absences, just taking a fortnight's holiday each year means that, between the ages of 5 to 16, a child would miss around half an academic year of learning.

Headteachers are only allowed to authorise any leave of absence when an application has been made in advance, and it's felt to be for an exceptional circumstance. The annual family holiday wouldn't be deemed an exceptional circumstance.

Unauthorised Absence Fines: Shropshire Council can give each parent a fine of £80 per child, rising to £160 if you do not pay within 21 days. From the 2024 to 2025 school year, each parent will only get up to 2 fines for the same child in a 3-year period. If you get a second fine in 3 years it will be £160. If you do not pay the fine in 28 days you may be taken to court for keeping your child out of school.

If your child is off school 3 or more times within the 3 years you will not be fined but may be taken to court.

Parents/carers should never simply discount the amount of a penalty notice from the cost of a cheaper holiday, because this is a criminal offence and when doing so they're always risking prosecution.

From January, all medical absences (including GP, dentist, opticians) must have evidence to support the absence. Without evidence, the absence will be deemed as unauthorised.
